REAL ESTATE SERVICES SPOTLIGHT



On behalf of the University, Real Estate Services is the UCI Campus and UCI Medical Center's real estate partner. Real Estate Services includes Rick Coulon, Helena Dedic, and Jessica Soto. The team handles a number of real estate services including:

- Space lease planning
- Real property sales and/or purchasing
- Ground lease management
- Real estate development and contract negotiation for nontraditional capital improvements with outside vendors
- Develop and negotiate licenses and other contract forms for property use and real property easements
- Provide internal and external consultation as it relates to all aspects of real estate issues
- Faculty home loan programs

Real Estate Services manages over 597,641 square feet of lease activity throughout the year including new leases and lease renewals. This past year, Helena Dedic, has completed over 30 facility use agreements, 17 licenses, 7 easements, and 71 leases and subleases.

As the Home Loan Coordinator, Jessica Soto administers the UC Mortgage Origination Program (MOP) and Supplemental Home Loan Program (SHLP) for the campus. MOP provides support to eligible employees in obtaining home loans offered through the University. This past year, the campus has completed a notable number of MOP and SHLP loans. Per UCOP's annual report, UCI leads the MOP program with the greatest number of funded MOP and SHLP loans in the UC system. In collaboration with UC Office of Loan Programs and the Irvine Campus Housing Authority (ICHA), Real Estate Services strives to deliver optimal options through the University's housing assistance programs.

EH&S PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION WORKSHOP



The first-ever EH&S Professional Education In-Person Workshop was held on Tuesday, November 14, 2017 at the University of California (UC) Irvine. The program provided 41 participants, from 7 campuses & locations, an overview of advanced topics in Environmental Health & Safety (EH&S), in addition to: hands-on exercises, networking with colleagues, and dialogue about core competencies such as communication, influence & negotiation, and program management. Course evaluations & tests were used to collect feedback and to assess participants' overall reactions, changes in behavior and learning, and demographic information.

OUTREACH - FRATERNITY ALCOHOL EDUCATION

With over four different fraternities in attendance, Officers Bessolo, Solomon, and Juarez spent a quiet evening educating students on practicing safe alcohol consumption - not only for their own safety, but also the safety of their friends.



Sharing the common pitfalls that students have made before them, they urged them to celebrate responsibly as one wrong decision can result in a DUI or even serious injury. Officer Juarez recounted a story where a student was arrested twice in less than twenty four hours for driving under the influence. "It's not worth it", said Officer Juarez, "because now that student and his parents will have to deal with the expensive legal fees associated with his two DUI offenses." With the popularity of Uber, officers encouraged students to be wise and make use of the service because it will keep them out of trouble.

The group also participated in mock field sobriety tests and ran through an obstacle course wearing drunk driving googles.



NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION - TO LIVE A "GREENER" LIFE



All of these resolutions are simple and are within your power to do.

These small changes will make a big difference to our environment and improve the quality of life for you, your children and future generations!

Minimize waste to landfill. Waste that goes to Landfill creates greenhouse gasses (methane) that are released, increasing global warming. Try thinking of waste as a precious resource that still has more useful life in it.

Ways you can minimize waste:

- Carry a reusable water bottle with you every day. By drinking from reusable bottles and cups you can stop buying water bottles. In the U.S. 50 billion plastic water bottles are used each year, but 38 billion of them never get recycled. 75% of these plastic bottles end up as litter polluting land or waterways and in landfills. At UCI we have over 160 locations to fill your reusable bottle with fresh, healthy filtered water that tastes great! Anteaters already reduce the use of 3 million water bottles each year by filling reusable bottles on campus.
- Use reusable bags. It takes 12 million barrels of oil to produce the number of plastic bags used in the U.S. each year. Paper bags aren't any better; the U.S. uses 14 million trees each year to produce the paper bags we use. By simply using reusable bags for all of your purchases you can stop that cycle of waste. Remember to refuse the box or bag. By refusing the box, bag, tray you become part of the solution!
- **Recycle.** When you dispose of boxes and other "clean and dry" items, remember to make sure the items get placed into blue recycle bins. Glass, plastics, paper, metal all can be recycled and become useful items again. Anteaters already divert 81% of waste away from landfill but our goal is 90% diversion. This simple act will reduce greenhouse gasses!
- **Compost whenever possible.** Food and yard waste can be used to create nutrient rich soils and energy sources if they are separated from trash. If you do not have your own compost bin, you can dine in the 26 places on campus that offer food waste composting.

What is one accomplishment at work that you are most proud of? Why? Making the decision to attempt a start of the Co-Generation Plant using the boiler feed pumps assigned to the smaller, original boilers

when the larger feed pumps for the Co-Gen were not available. It was successful and we achieved approximately 60% of power producing capacity.

How has UCI/department helped you in your career development? I've always wanted an opportunity to work in a Co-Generation Power Plant as an Operator and this happened for me when UCI made the decision about 11 years ago to build such a plant here and provide the necessary training for the Central Plant Operators.

Who is one colleague that deserves praise and recognition? Why Carlos Perez. Carlos has been with us for 4.5 years and has a tremendous background in power plant experience from plants in the USA and many other countries. In addition to his accomplishments and work performance at Central Plant, Carlos seems to always have an answer for every technical question asked of him or he always provides solutions to operational problems to co-workers and management.
